#### **BELL AND WELCOME**

#### THANKSGIVING FOR MUSIC

For the music of the spheres, for the morning stars singing together, for the joyful shouts of all the heavenly beings [Job 38:7], for the angels and the living creatures singing before the throne of God [Revelation 7:11-12], for music of exquisite beauty that moves us to tears: we rejoice and give thanks to God.

For sopranos—and for sousaphones, saxophones, sackbuts, shawms, and shekeres; for mezzos—and for mbiras, marimbas, maracas, and metallophones; for seas that roar, for rivers that clap and hills that ring out [Psalm 98:7-8], for birds that sing: **we rejoice and give thanks to God.** 

For altos—and for accordions and autoharps; for contraltos and countertenors—and for clarinets, cornets, castanets, celestas, cymbals, and cellos; for choirs and their conductors and directors; for composers and arrangers; for hymn writers, who give us text and tune: **we rejoice and give thanks to God.** 

For tenors—and for theorbos, timpani, triangles, trumpets, trombones, tambourines, and tubas; for baritones and basses—and for basset horns, bassoons, bagpipes, and mixing-bowl bells; for voices, violins, violas, and vielles; for symphonies and bands, for organs and horns: we rejoice and give thanks to God.

For patrons of the arts and piano tuners; for transposers, transcribers, and improvisers; for editors and publishers; for the adaptability of artists and their creativity with new forms of music-making; for recording studios; for livestream, videos, and virtual concerts: **we rejoice and give thanks to God.** 

For four-part harmony and Gregorian chant; for call and response, for canons and rounds, for spirituals, for songs of exaltation and praise; for the hymn sung by Jesus and the disciples after the last supper and before going out into the night of betrayal and desertion [Mark 14:26]; we rejoice and give thanks to God.

For this gift of music, which, next to the word of God, deserves the highest praise [Martin Luther]; for a means to express that which seems inexpressible; for the rests in between the notes; and for the sound of sheer silence [1 Kings 19:12]: we rejoice and give thanks to God.

But when we cannot sing the Lord's song in a strange land [ $_{Psalm\ 137:4}$ ], when we have hung up our harps and wept [ $_{Psalm\ 137:2}$ ], when we are imprisoned, when we are overcome with grief, then: For songs without words and songs of protest, for singing and making melody in our hearts [ $_{Ephesians\ 5:19}$ ], for keening and wailing, and for laments and for requiems: **we rejoice and give thanks to God.**



#### FIRST READING Acts 11:1–18

A reading from Acts.

<sup>1</sup>Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the gentiles had also accepted the word of God. 2So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, <sup>3</sup>saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" 4Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, 5"I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners, and it came close to me. <sup>6</sup>As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. 7I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' But I replied, 'By no means, Lord, for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' 9But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' 10 This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. <sup>11</sup>At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. 12 The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six believers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. <sup>13</sup>He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; 14he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be

saved.' <sup>15</sup>And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. <sup>16</sup>And I remembered the word of the Lord, how Jesus had said, 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' <sup>17</sup>If then God gave them the same gift that God gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" <sup>18</sup>When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the gentiles the repentance that leads to life."
